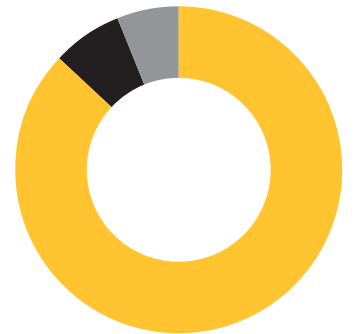

EFFICIENCY

- **87%** – Program Services
- **7%** – Management and General
- **6%** – Fundraising



PROGRAM SERVICES

- **42%** – Health, including physical and mental well-being
- **24%** – Economic well-being, including the ability to provide basic material needs as well as income and asset growth
- **22%** – Safety from physical, sexual and psychological harm
- **10%** – Education, including literacy and numeracy, social-emotional and life skills, as well as providing safe schools
- **2%** – Power to have influence over the decisions that affect their lives
