I am stuck in Ukraine and trying to get out. What can I do?

While we are doing everything we can as an organization to respond to the needs of the Ukrainian people who are fleeing for safety, we unfortunately do not facilitate evacuations or relocations.

Finally, we are aware that there are other groups taking advantage of people's extreme vulnerability at this time, so please do be cautious with information sources and referrals as you navigate this difficult situation.

I want to apply to become a refugee in the US. What can I do?

Resettlement of Ukrainians to the U.S. would follow normal pathways under the U.S. Refugee Admissions Program. Refugees who have fled are referred to the U.S. government by either the UN Refugee Agency, a qualified NGO, or a U.S. embassy. Applicants then undergo security vetting and other processing steps that can take several years to complete.

For people in Ukraine who are already in the refugee resettlement process through the Resettlement Support Center (RSC) Eurasia/IOM (Ukrainian cases or otherwise), if the original address on file with the RSC has changed, email the RSC at <u>icc@iom.int</u> to provide a new location and contact details.

How can I get a visa to come to the US?

On February 13, 2022, the Department of State suspended consular services, including interview waiver services, at the U.S. Embassy in Kyiv. Applicants for U.S. nonimmigrant visas may apply in any country in which they are physically present and where there are appointments available.

People who have an immigrant visa currently pending with the U.S. Embassy Kyiv may be able to transfer processing of an immigration case to another U.S. Embassy. They must contact the receiving U.S Embassy in that country to authorize and initiate transfer. The Embassy will have a list of requirements which must be satisfied in order to begin the transfer process.

Ukrainians with close U.S. citizen family members in the U.S. may be eligible for family-based immigrant visas. Information and eligibility information is at <u>www.uscis.gov</u>. As each U.S. Embassy has specific application procedures, applicants should contact the
